Grievance Day Will Be Held Tuesday

Nieder Declares Law Is Plain

GENEVA.—An explanation of his recommendation changing valuation of Geneva properties, for tax purposes, from 80 per cent to 100 per cent, brought from Mayor Charles F. Nieder over the weekend the fact that "under state law, all real property must be assessed at its full value." This was given as the principal reason for the action here, it is said.

However, Geneva taxpayers who have spoken in their assessments boosted, are expressing dissatisfaction, and on Tuesday at 10 A.M. it is expected that hundreds of taxpayers will converge on the assessor's office in city hall and demand a review of their assessment.

CITY ASSESSORS Harold T. Coon, Irma J. Mulvey and Christine Tandle, have announced that they will meet in their office at that time.

While it has been inferred that the rate had spoken of in a new one, Dr. Robert A. Cole, chairman of the city council's finance committee declared "As far as I know, it has been a state law since 1851, that municipalities should assess real property up to 100 per cent of its value. There are only two cities in the state that are now doing this, Auburn and Long Beach."

COUNCILMAN COLE referred to Mayor Nieder's statement saying that with the 100 per cent assessment there should be a lower tax rate, Cole charged that Geneva taxpayers will pay more under 100 per cent assessment valuation, unless the tax rate drops below what it is now.

Cole brought out that Auburn and Long Beach have tax rates of \$17 and \$16 respectively under 100 per cent assessment, while Geneva, assessed at 80 per cent has a tax rate of only about \$13.

IT SEEMS to be generally understood here that the city tax rate depends on the budget requirements of the fiscal year. If Geneva continues to spend money the tax rate will go higher, but if civic expenditures are kept down the tax rate will be correspondingly lower, it is said.

Councilman Cole declared that the city of Geneva is not hard up for money as far as taxing is concerned. "We can still raise \$100,000 and stay within state limitations," he said.

Referring to grievance day, scheduled for Tuesday, Mayor Nieder said he believed Geneva taxpayers should visit the assessor's office, obtain whatever information they may require and express opinions.

"Immediately after grievance day, if you go to confer with the Board of Assessors and I assure taxpayers that their wishes in the matter will be carried out by the board of myself."

GENEVA—Alfred H. Dewey, a member of the Ontario County Board of Supervisors for 14 years, was chosen as a candidate for reelection at Saturday's Republican caucus in Canandaigua town, winning out in a three-way fight Dewey received 80 votes, Maynard E. Estey, 71 and Vick G. Munson, 66.

Party caucuses will be held in various towns of the county this week.

In Phelps the Republican caucus will be held at 8 tonight. Arthur E. Hawkins of South Bristol, supervisor for 10 years, says that pressure from other matters will keep him from being a candidate. The name of Richard Morse has been mentioned on Friday night. Republicans in Bristol will caucus with James G. Reed assured of nomination for another term.

EAST BLOOMFIELD residents will caucus Friday night with Floyd W. Rayburn seeking renomination. The Democratic caucus will be held the same night with the name of Walter Neenan, mentioned as candidate for the Board of Supervisors.

UTICA—Dragging operation in Oneida Lake were continued today in an effort to recover the body of Benjamin Novak, 39, of 1114 Seymour st., this city, who drowned Saturday night when the boat he and a companion, Michael Kuzmich, 49, were fishing from, capsized in water roughed by a brisk wind.

The tragedy occurred about 9:30 P.M. just a little ways from shore, about three miles east of Cleveland and about one mile west of Jewell.

Kuzmich, who clung to a life preserver after the boat sank beneath the surface, was rescued from the water by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wetzel, who heard his cries for help and sped to the scene in their outboard motorboat.

AFTER PICKING Kuzmich up and placing him in the boat, a search for the body of Novak was made, but it was not found. Authorities were immediately notified.

Rescue parties from the surrounding area, under the direction of State Police, Sunday continued dragging the lake, but with no results. Early this morning the search for the body was once again resumed.

State Police, who are investigating the case, are Trooper James Leahy of Camden, Trooper William Rogers of Oneida and Trooper Karl Maurice of Sylvan Beach. Troopers Hugh Maher and W. C. Zapf assisted Sunday all day dragging operations. Cpl. Howard Lutz and Game Protector Harry Best of Cleveland, also joined the rescue parties.
