Plane Breaks Apart Over **Oneida Lake**

Lakeport Man Sees Tragedy From Residence

By WALTER CARROLL

A Lakeport resident watched horrified yesterday as the wing of a single-engine plane snapped off and the pilot spun to an icy death in Oneida Lake.

State police and other searchers last night began grappling for a body they behaved to be that of Charles H Jacobs, 22, of Vernon owner of the light aluminum monoplane Jacobs was reported to be a student pilot

The tragedy occurred at 2 10 pm. At 1 pm Jacobs refueled the plane at Canasiota and signed the gasoline receipt

Walter Boland, 38, who witnessed the crash, said he was taking home movies in his front yard when he noticed the plane flying west about a mile offshore

Boland said the plane's motor quit and that when the pilot tried to start it again the wing tore off. Boland said ne dashed 'o his phone as the small plane began spinning to the lake with its wing falling after it. He said other pieces of the plane were thrown off as it dropped
