Archbishop Hanna Dies At 83 in Rome

Notable Churchman and Labor Arbitrator Was Native of Rochester

Rome, July 10 (AP)—The Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, Catholic archbishop of San Francisco from 1915 to 1935, and widely-known for his work on behalf of immigrants and as a labor arbitrator, died today in Rome, where he had lived since his retirement. He had been in ill health for some time.

In 1913 the then Bishop Hanna was appointed a member of a California state immigration and housing commission, playing a leading role in a program of reform in labor camps.

He served on an arbitration board settling labor disputes in the San Francisco building trades, and in 1934, upon President Roosevelt's appointment, headed the board bringing peace in a Pacific Coast strike of marine workers.

While serving as professor of theology at St. Bernard's Seminary at Rochester, N. Y., he took an active interest in immigrants, particularly in Italians in that city, and this work was one factor in confirmation in 1912 of his appointment as auxiliary bishop of the California diocese.

He was consecrated in 1912 as titular bishop of Tetsopolis, and became head of the archdiocese in 1915 upon the death of Archbishop P. V. Riordan. Born in Rochester, July 21, 1860, he was ordained in 1885 after attending the American College at Rome, and returned to Rochester in 1887, teaching Latin in St. Andrew's Seminary.

Upon his retirement as Archbishop of San Francisco, Pope Pius XI named his titular archbishop of Gorthyna, an honorary office. Funeral services will be held Thursday.

William Hunt, 77, Retired Warden of Attica Prison, Dead

Buffalo, July 10 (AP)—William Hunt, 77, warden of Attica Prison from 1931 to his retirement in 1943, died yesterday.

As first warden of Attica Prison, he was drafted to serve three consecutive two-year extensions after reaching the mandatory retirement age of 70.

In 1913 Hunt was elected first commissioner of charities and corrections in Erie County, on the Democratic ticket, after serving two years as keeper of the Erie County Penitentiary.

Commissioner for six years, he was appointed warden of Great Meadow Prison at Comstock in 1920, and from there went to Attica.

Used Passenger Automobiles Under Price Control Today

Washington, July 10 (AP)—Used passenger automobiles come under price control today with all makes and models of used automobiles covered by ceiling prices. Sales by individuals as well as dealers are affected.

The Office of Price Administration said that the used car business, with an annual sales volume of nearly \$2,000,000, was until today the largest industry that had not been subject to ceiling prices.

Requiring both the seller and the buyer to sign a certificate of transfer, the new order was designed, OPA said, to protect the individual buyer from being overcharged and to guard dealers from unfair competition.

The buyer files the certificate with the local rationing board when he applies for gasoline coupons for the car. The certificate describes the car sold and the price paid. The local board checks the certificate to see that the price is in accordance with the OPA regulation.

U. S. Economist Sees Need for More Pay To Latin Americans

Yellow Springs, O., July 10 (AP)—

A "truly democratic" labor organization is needed to help increase wages in Latin America, Raymond W. Logan, dean of the graduate school at Howard University, Washington, D. C., asserted today.

"I believe a labor organization, based on strong democratic labor organizations like the C. I. O., in Latin America, would greatly aid in raising the wages of workers in the Latin American nations."

Wages also could be increased, he declared, if United States citizens were willing to pay higher prices for goods bought from neighbors to the south.

"We enjoy our sugar, coffee, bananas, lin and other products at low prices in part because of the low wages paid to workers in Latin American nations," Logan said. "Unless we as individuals are willing to pay higher prices for those products with the assurance that the increase will go into the pockets of the workers, we are merely paying lip service to the good neighbor policy."
